Thank you for making 2017 yet another remarkable year for Community Lodgings! This year marked 30 years of service to Alexandria's most vulnerable community. Our dedicated staff and board have done an incredible job in expanding our outreach while



strengthening our programs and services. I am in awe when I reflect on how much Community Lodgings does in terms of the services we offer, the amount of people we serve, and the profound success we have had "Opening Doors to Independence" for each and every person who walks through our doors.

In 2017-2018:

- Most of our focus was on improving our infrastructure, we completed renovation of 607 Notabene Drive, a 7-unit apartment building that houses low-moderate income families.
- We cultivated relationships with community organizations, setting the stage for enriching our youth education program by opening a third afterschool program at Beverly Hills Community United Methodist Church.
- Over the coming months, we will formalize our partnerships and our direction through a new strategic plan, which will define Community Lodgings role in addressing the emerging needs in the community.

We have worked hard to ensure that this report accurately reflects our exciting work. We hope you enjoying learning about the community we serve, the inspiring forward momentum we are creating in communities facing crippling poverty, and about the vital role donors like you play in our efforts to combat hunger, homelessness and general poverty in our own backyard.

Helping the Homeless

Community Lodgings celebrates 30 years.

For 30 years, Community Lodgings has provided transitional housing to homeless and low income residents in an effort to provide a path to self-sufficiency. On Feb. 17, the nonprofit held its 30th anniversary Pearl Gala to recognize its founding organizations and volunteer contributions.

“Tonight is an opportunity to honor the past and think about the future,” said Community Lodgings board chair Marie Muscella.

More than 180 people attended the reception at Belle Haven Country Club, which honored several individuals and raised \$63,000 to fund programs for disadvantaged youth and families.

We believe that education is one of the keys to overcoming poverty. Many of our students are first-generation Americans. Our staff assists them with learning English, improving math skills, and developing socially. There are no words to describe the joy we feel when we see our students thrive.

Girls on the Run

Girls On The Run is a non-profit that was founded in 1996 in Charlotte, North Carolina with the assistance of thirteen girls. The organization envisions a world where every girl knows and activates her limitless potential and is free to boldly pursue her dreams. In September of 2018, we incorporated Girls On The Run as a means to build confidence and self esteem through fitness.

Job Readiness

The goal of the program is to provide students with an enriching and constructive experience to gain exposure to an array of careers and obtain hands-on experience. At the conclusion of the summer program, six of our students received three of the top four prizes out of 200 students in the city during the awards and ceremony presentation. We also received the Corporate Responsibility Award.

Just Some of Our Recent Successes!

 **127 students were served across three sites.**

 **98% of students advanced at least one reading level between September 2017 and August 2018.**


 **100% of students in after-school and mentoring program were promoted to the next grade level.**

Gabriel is an outgoing and creative student that has made strides in his time with Community Lodgings. He started with us in the first grade without knowing English. Staff and volunteers witnessed his vocabulary increase, reading skills flourish, and his writing skills develop each day. It was exciting to see him grow into an inquisitive and bright young man. It was a special day last year when his mother came in to ask us to translate a document from a teacher that stated Alex placed out of English Language Learning Services. Gabriel was speaking and reading on grade

level. He transitioned to being bilingual with English and Spanish to support his steps academics and future. In addition, Gabriel's father began working at a local nonprofit to increase the household income. When summer school ended, Gabriel was excited to start the after-school program again and continues to request creative journal entries and supplemental work to complement his interests. In the spring of 2018, we learned he was honored by ACPS for his poem and represented his school at the awards ceremony and received a cash prize.



WHERE WE SERVE

Since its inception, Community Lodgings has been committed to supporting homeless individuals and families in Alexandria, VA. Our mission is to lift families from instability to self-sufficiency by providing them with transitional and affordable housing and youth education services. The need for our services is great, and the demand continues to increase throughout our community.



The cost of living in Northern VA is 40% higher than the national average*

City of Alexandria families must earn an average of \$70,000 a year to live comfortably

Community Lodgings clients earn an average of \$43,864 per year, while the U.S. Census Bureau QuickFacts cite the 2016 median city income of \$89,200.**

55% of adults in homeless families were employed.***

Median home price in the City of Alexandria is \$490,000 and median rent per month is \$2600****



HOUSING

Transitional Housing

The Transitional Housing Program (THP) supports six homeless families at a time with subsidized housing and supportive services for up to two years. We also provide case management on a regular basis with the ultimate goal of self-sufficiency for each of our clients.

250 families moved out of homelessness and learned the skills necessary for lasting independence since Community Lodgings' onset.



The 2018 Point In Time report by The Partnership to Prevent & End Homelessness in the City of Alexandria revealed

the count of homeless persons increased by 7% from the previous year. On January 24, 2018, there were 226 persons experiencing homelessness, including 29 families with 53 children in Alexandria.

HOUSING

Affordable Housing

With the completion of the renovations of the Notabene Drive building, we were able to increase our stock of affordable housing from 38 to 39 units. In order to qualify for the housing program, families can earn no more than 60% of the area median income.

At Community Lodgings we cherish our volunteers and realize that we would not be able to serve Alexandria's most vulnerable families without their help and dedication.




We recorded a total of 2282 volunteer hours in 2018.


